You may receive a phone call from each department.

**REGISTERED NURSE from the PRE-ANESTHESIA DEPARTMENT:**

Prior to your surgery, a nurse may contact you by telephone.

If you receive a phone message, please note the extension and call that extension directly.

The nurse will review medical history, anesthesia experiences, medications, Advance Directive and pre-operative instructions. The nurse will help guide you through the process and answer any questions you may have.

Please have medications, over-the-counter remedies, vitamins and supplements on hand to refer to.

**PRE-SURGICAL INSTRUCTIONS**  
*at Exeter Hospital*

For your safety, please follow the advice in this educational booklet. **Failure to follow instructions may result in delay or cancellation of surgery.**

## FOLLOW ALL STEPS PRIOR TO SURGERY:

### 2 Weeks Prior

- Stop all herbal medications unless otherwise instructed by physician.
- If you are having anesthesia for your procedure please arrange for a ride to and from the hospital.
- It is strongly recommended that you have a responsible person stay with you for the first 24 hours after surgery to ensure your safety.

### 1 Week Prior

#### **Medications & Your Surgery**

- If you take medications for diabetes, aspirin containing products, blood thinners or medicine for arthritis, please contact the doctor/nurse practitioner who prescribed the medication for instructions.
- Ask the surgeon:  
“Can I take anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDS), such as Aleve®, Motrin®, Ibuprofen or Advil® 7 days prior to surgery?”

### 1-2 Days Prior

You may call the department where surgery is scheduled 2 days prior between 1:30 pm and 4:30 pm to obtain a tentative arrival time (Monday – Friday). **Your arrival time is subject to change and will be finalized the day before surgery.**

**Note:** Location may change. If a change occurs, you will be contacted by our staff.

**Notify your physician of any health changes such as a cold or fever.**

### Bathing

- Follow specific bathing instructions from your surgeon.
- Please be sure to shower/bathe and shampoo the night prior to or morning of procedure. Do not apply any styling or beauty products to the skin or hair.

**Failure to follow instructions may result in delay or cancellation of surgery.**

### Eating and Drinking

- Be sure to brush your teeth and/or use mouthwash before surgery, but please do not swallow any toothpaste or mouthwash.
- Please do not chew gum, have candy, throat lozenges, or breath mints the day of your surgery.
- Nothing solid to eat after **MIDNIGHT** the night before your surgery.
- You may drink **clear liquids up to 2 hours before** your scheduled arrival time at the hospital. The following are generally considered clear liquids:
  - Water (plain, carbonated or flavored).
  - Clear fruit juices without pulp, such as apple or white grape juice.
  - **NO** orange juice.
  - Carbonated drinks, including dark sodas (cola and root beer).
  - Tea or coffee without milk or cream.
  - Sports drinks, nothing RED in color.
  - Clear, fat-free broth (bouillon or consommé).
  - Ice pops **WITHOUT** milk, bits of fruit, seeds or nuts.

### The Morning of Surgery

- If you take prescription medication for lungs, thyroid, blood pressure, seizures or stomach problems, take them with water.
- **Take heart medications except diuretics (water pills).**

### The Morning of Surgery (continued)

- If you have diabetes or take blood thinners, follow specific instructions given by your care provider.
- Stop all over-the-counter vitamins and antacids such as Tums®, Pepcid Complete®, Gaviscon® or Mylanta®.

### What to Bring

- Your insurance card and identification.
- A copy of your Advance Directive.
- If you have sleep apnea and a planned overnight stay, bring your machine with you to the hospital.
- Remote for stimulators.
- Leave all valuables at home.

### What to Wear or Not Wear

- Wear comfortable, loose clothing and flat shoes.
- Wear eye glasses. Do not wear contacts.
- All jewelry, body piercings and hair pins **MUST BE REMOVED.**

### How to Travel and Park

**Please make every effort to arrive on time.**

If you are going to be late, call the department where surgery is scheduled (*OSC or Inpatient Surgery*).

If you are receiving anesthesia, a designated driver must be used. **Please ask if you do not know.** If cab or transport service is taken, you must be accompanied by a responsible adult.

- All patients enter through the main entrance opposite the parking garage.
- Please do not park in the parking lot in front of the Emergency Department.
- Free valet parking, wheel chairs and assistance are available at the main entrance.
